on county assessment rolls this year than there were four years ago, according to a report filed with the board of supervisors by county Assessor John R. Quinn.

The 1941 roll shows a total of 5,738 wells, as against 4,737 in 1937. There are 22 oil fields within the county. Decrease of nearly 15 per cent in the assessed values of oil property was noted, the total being \$151,975,000 this year, as against \$166,400,000 last year.

Also on the assessment are 491 mer.

Also on the assessment roll are 491 water distributing systems, an increase of 45 over 1940, Quim's report stated. Assessed value of these systems rose more than 9 per cent this year, to a total of \$2,500,500.

The assessor reported that he had found 3,143 more business firms in operation this year than a year ago, the total being 167, 978. This was near 18,000 more firms than were found when the 1937 roll was prepared, showing the growth of the county.

In its annual survey of residential property, the contents of 44,444 new 'dwellings were appraised for the first time this year. More than 800,000 residential units were visited by a staff of 800 field deputies, many of whom had to be trained.
