A gift of increasing historical value was presented to Bert S. Crossland Post, No. 170, American Leglon, 14 years ago next Saturday night.

It was on Nov. 1, 1927 that Mrs. L. C. Torrance, sister-inlaw of the founder of this city; gave the Leglon post a splendid collection of 76. World War posters and a number of framed pictures of Civil War scenes.

The collection, which included many foreign posters, is unusually complete. During recent years the local Leglon post has learned that its exhibit is believed to be the only one of its kind outside the Library of Congress.
