5,100 HOMES NEEDED HERE FOR WORKERS

(Continued from 1-A) billion dollar appropriation for F.H.A. is authorized by Congress. At least one builder who has erected hundreds of F.H.A. homes in the vicinity of the Douglas Aircraft plant in North Long Beach has predicted that 'Torrance will be the next hot-spot' for building.

He has been making extensive investigations of local conditions during the past week with a view to launching an F.H.A. subdivision within this city as soon as Congress passes the new appropriation.

Last week the House of Representatives unanimously passed a \$500,000,000 appropriation to continue Title VI of the F.H.A. and the bill is expected to come before the U. S. Senate next week.

Attractive to Capital The new authorization of Title VI, according to Harry Frank, president of the Building Contractors Association of California, 'has more liberal provisions and brings an increased opportunity to provide needed construction and at the same time get into a profitable investment field.'

The amendments now in Congress, Frank said, 'authorize mortgage insurance for \$500,000,000 worth of construction, as against \$300,000,000 granted in the first Title VI authorization last year.'

Members of the Torrance housing committee point out that this community will be particularly attractive to private capital under the new F.H.A. bill, as the industrial plants located here are largely of a basic nature.

Why Torrance Is Stable The demand for these basic steel and aluminum products will be great because of the present curtailment in manufacturing materials for peace time.

Because of these post-war factors, it is believed that private capital will be more easily attracted to Torrance. Purchasers of homes will continue to be employed after the war and be able to keep up their installment payments.

Air Raid Test Demonstrations Are Permitted

Food Planning Chief Theme of Cooking School

(Continued from Page 1-A) an increasingly large number engaged one way or another in America's war effort, asked us about this important change in our present day scheme of things. There are many small families who need help in small quantity meal planning in order to avoid or manage the 'left-over' problem. To always plan to have left-overs is expensive. They require a second handling, cooking and often an additional cost for added ingredients.

'On the other hand there are many choice dishes the small family could not have if a second meal was not planned of it. A good steak, for instance. They don't come very small, so plan to use a portion of the sirloin, the flank end of pork-butt or that extra cubed steak in some such manner as this: Brown 2 tablespoons of sliced onion in 1 tablespoon of shortening, add diced meat, 1/2 cup cooked peas, carrots, celery or a combination of these with 1 cup white sauce, gravy or mushroom soup. Put in a small casserole. Top with hot mashed potato or baking powder biscuits (bake rest of biscuits on a separate pan.) Bake the meat pie in a hot oven (400 degree F.) about 20 minutes. Serve with fruit salad.'
