Put your house in order if you would avoid barked shins, stubbed toes or more serious injury during blackouts.
This timely advice is contained in an article by Helen Keating Neal, assistant to the director, American Red Cross Home (Arcident Prevention Service, in the April issue of the Red Cross Home (Courier from Washington.)


