## L.A. Sewage **Plant Permit Is Cancelled**

Branding Los Angeles city's ewage treatment plant at Hy-perion a menace to public health, the State Board of Puhhealth, the State Board of Puh-lic Health canceled the city's permit to operate it yesterday. The board notified the L.A. city council that water and beach pollution near the outfall sewer is so great that the permit must be revoked.

The caustic letter marks the latest step in a long chain of attempts by city, county and state health authorities to force rehabilitation of Los Angeles' cracked, leaky, inadequate sew-age system.

The Hyperion plant, nidway between the most popular bath-ing beaches of Santa Monica Bay, sends sewage into a broken submarine tainel which reaches into the ocean.



at this Hyperion plant. In addition, 3300 miles of tributary
sewers pour 200 tons of sewage
into the plant daily.
Engineers admit the Hyperion
facilities act merely as a sieve,
screening 3 to 5 per cent of the
largest solids from the flow. The
remainder roars into the broken
ocean pipe.
At present, Los Angeles has
no alternative but to ignore the
State Board of Health permit
cancellation.
City Health Officer George M.
Uhl said if sewage were not
sent thru the screening plant,
the city would have to dump it
directly into the ocean.


