Pension Office In Torrance At Job Bureau

The Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance has established a "Contact Station" in Torrance at the office of the United States Employment Service, 1927 Carson St., advised J. G. Bretherton, manager of the Long Beach Field office.

"Due to the increased work load it has been found necessary to establish a meeting place where persons living in or near Torrance can meet with a representative of the Long Beach field office rather than have to make a trip into Long Beach," Bretherton said.

"One of our field men will be at the Torrance office of the United States Employment Service each Wednesday at 1 p. m.," Bretherton continued, "in order to help insured wage earners file their claims for Old-Age and Survivors Insurance benefits when they have retired upon reaching age 65 or in the case of a death, assist their next of kin."

The representative will also be able to assist employers and employees with missing account numbers, wage discrepancies and other problems that might arise under the administration of Title II of the Social Security Act.

Ending as it began—with San Pedro teams copping first places—the 1942 Marine League track season bowed out in Lomita. The Pirates took only three firsts in the varsity events but swept up for a flock of seconds, thirds and fourths to keep the Class A title with 73 points.

Barney Henderson was Narbonne's mainstay, winning both hurdles and the broad jump to give the Lomitan's second place and 57 points. Gardens was third with 22 1/2. Banning, fourth with 17. Shipment of packages to members of the armed forces by their families has created a new duty for the bureau of entomology and plant quarantine. Director of Agriculture W. J. Cecil reported to Gov. Culbert Olson, however, that of the many packages opened only one contained contraband—two Michigan apples.

FHA Title 6 Renewal Brings Building Revival

Building of homes for war workers was given a big green light when President Roosevelt signed a bill renewing the authority of the Federal Housing Administration to insure building loans for war workers' homes, according to Harry Frank, president of the Building Contractors Association of California.

The legislation, Frank said, extends the life of Title VI, the section of the National Housing Act governing mortgage insurance for war housing. The bill provides no appropriation or voting of funds but gives FHA authority to insure \$500,000,000 more in loans for war workers' homes.

"The building of war houses," Frank said, "had slowed down seriously in the past several weeks since FHA reached the limit of the \$300,000,000 insurance authority previously granted. Now that mortgage insurance is again available, thousands of building loans which had been held up can be put through and construction on thousands of war workers' homes can be started."

To qualify for Title VI mortgage insurance a house must be built in an officially designated defense housing area and must sell for not more than \$6,000 or rent for not more than \$50 a month. "War workers will enjoy better conditions for financing homes under the renewed authorization than under the original form of Title VI," Frank said. "They can now borrow as much as \$5400 with FHA mortgage insurance; the former maximum was \$4000. The amortization period is increased from 20 to 25 years."

Ration Books Now Available in Torrance

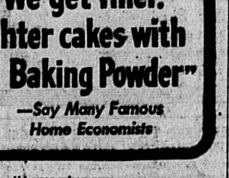
