Traffic Arrests Set New Record in California

Johnny Q. Motorist broke all records last year for getting himself into trouble. The state department of motor vehicles' bureau of statistics has reported that traffic arrests in California in 1941 exceeded all previous records.

A total of 575,222 traffic cases were heard before the courts and convictions were obtained in 564,194, the majority of which were for speed law and rules of the road violations. Large increases were noted in drunken driving cases.

BERKELEY—The University of California, a community with an average daily population of more than 20,000, probably has less crime and fewer traffic accidents than any civic community of a fraction of its size. This is a statement of Captain Walter Lee, chief of the University of California police division.

Captain Lee states that he believes the students of the University are the most law-abiding group in the world. Burglary and petty theft are negligible, and reports of robbery are rare. Only 63 cases of law violations involving students of the University were reported by police departments near the campus last year; most of these involved minor infractions growing out of football game enthusiasm.

Uruguay is the smallest republic in South America, with an area of only 72,153 square miles.

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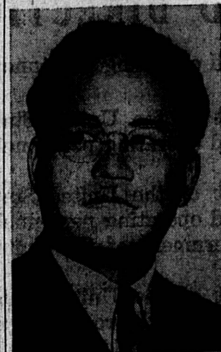

NEW WAR INSURANCE FOR HOMES AVAILABLE JUNE 20

Any property owner can obtain the Government's new insurance protection against damage to private property from enemy attack by consulting his own agent, according to information received here this week.

Your own insurance agent or broker will receive necessary instructions from Washington on, or about June 20. Blanket protection formerly furnished by the RFC's War Damage Corporation without requiring a contract or the premiums will expire June 30 and will be replaced by this new form of coverage.

Under the new plan, insurance companies will act as fiduciary agents for the War Damage Corporation in writing policies and collecting premiums. Applications for protection against enemy attack should be made before June 30 if possible, as coverage will not take effect until three days after application and check are filed.

This insurance covers physical loss of real or personal prop-

Seeks Re-election To Justice Court

Re-election as Justice of the Peace, Inglewood Township, office No. 2, is sought by Judge Collamer A. Bridge, who filed his declaration of intention to succeed himself late last week. If elected, the Hermosa Beach jurist asserts he will carry on in the same intelligent manner that his many years' experience on the bench have given him.

Judge Bridge is no stranger to the bench. He has been in active law practice in Southern California for 25 years, serving as judge for 20 years. As judge he has sat in courts in Torrance, El Segundo, Inglewood, Hawthorne, Los Angeles, Gardena, Manhattan Beach and Redondo Beach.

At present, in addition to his duties as Justice of the Peace of Inglewood Township, he is presiding over court in El Segundo, Gardena and Redondo Beach. In the last named city he is sitting for Sam G. Austin, police judge, now recovering at Torrance Memorial hospital from injuries suffered in an automobile accident.

Cites Qualifications
"I do not believe the qualifications for a good judge have altered since the beginning of the history of this country," Judge Bridge stated. "Qualities of open-mindedness to bring about unbiased, ability to differentiate between cause and effect and a thorough knowledge of law are qualifications for which every aspirant to a judicial position should constantly strive. To accomplish this, the aspirant for a judgeship should remain free from attachments that might in any way impair his sense of justice and fair play."
