Notice: CONCERNING EXTENSION OF Electrical Service

War Production Board approval is now required for electrical service installations, whether for new customers or for any increase in present customers' requirements.

Before you plan new construction involving electrical service, or plan any change in present service requirements for your home, store, plant or on your farm, discuss your probable electric service needs with the nearest War Production Board office or with your local Edison office.

Copper, rubber, steel or other critical materials are not available for new wiring or utility service unless essential to the war effort.

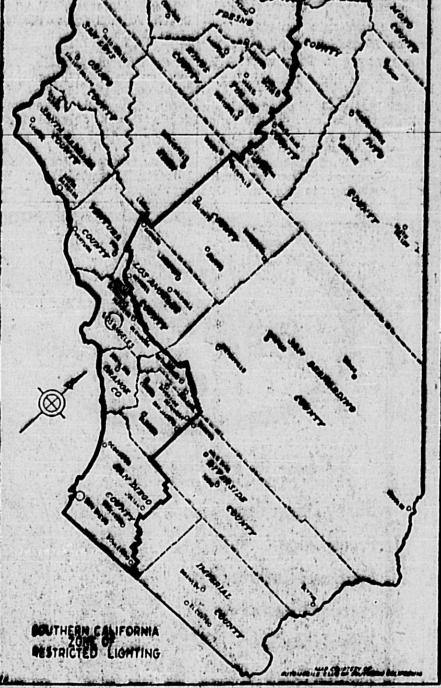

"It's the war," says Mrs. Eva Wolverton of 2378 237th st., explaining why she seldom sees two of her five boys the same day.

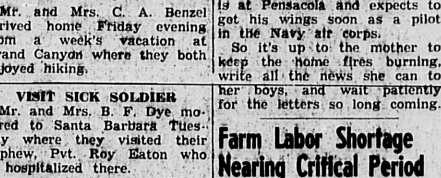
All but one are in service. Claude works at the docks and stays with his mother. Jim, the youngest, enlisted in Company H, 8th Guard.

Farm Labor Shortage Nearing Critical Period

Age is rapidly approaching the start of the critical period—the August-September-October harvests.

Director Ralph G. Wadsworth of the California U. S. Employment Service, admits "great difficulty" is anticipated in meeting the needs for the peak harvests. Seasonal farm workers in the state increased by 3,000 last week, raising the total of farm laborers now in the fields to 71,000.

At the same time, available jobs dropped 1,000, leaving about 3,000 jobs offered listed. Wadsworth pointed out that while there now is an estimated surplus of 7,000 farm workers, in most case there is no way to get the 7,000 into very many of the 3,000 jobs to be filled.

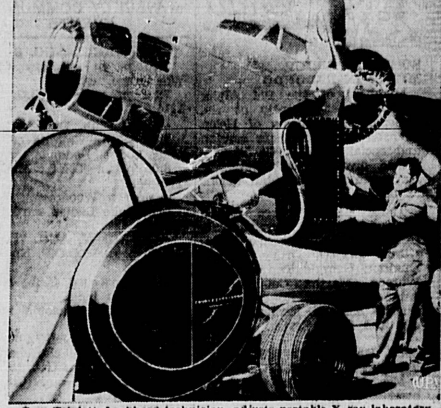
