(Continued from Page 1-A) the people of Torrance I shall be indebted forever. Lomita gave Shidler a plurality vote although he took only two of the 10 precincts in that community. The former Torrance magistrate now a private in the Army lost two Harbor City precincts but received a lead in the third that enabled him to claim that community. The complete but unofficial returns from the three communities in the special election were:

Next in interest to local voters was the two-man Assembly race between Jimmy O'Toole of Torrance and Vincent Thomas, the San Pedro incumbent. O'Toole evidently didn't click with those who went to the polls in this area—he polled 98 to Thomas' 750 in Torrance and 200 to the San Pedro's 418 in Lomita. The Torrance man carried only two of his home precincts and only managed to tie one Lomita polling place with Thomas.

In the only other "clean cut" race between campaigners, the contest for Justice of the Peace, Office No. 2, serving this area, Judge Colamer A. Bridge, incumbent, topped Judge Frank Parent, 639 to 611 in Torrance, 385 to 307 in Lomita, 248 to 199 in Hermosa Beach (incomplete) and 692 to 394 in Manhattan Beach, also incomplete.

City Employees Reject Pay Plan; Seek Negotiation

(Continued from Page 1-A) Our major complaint with the city council is its failure to negotiate with the union in good faith. On Tuesday, July 28, 1942, the Honorable Mayor advised our delegation that we would be given an opportunity to go over the proposed city budget with the city council within the first 10 days in August. On Wednesday, Aug. 19, 1942, we were advised by the Mayor that it is not possible to see the budget before it is adopted. This we consider a breach of good faith by the Mayor and the council.

We insist on seeing the budget while it is tentative before it is finished. Our reason is very plain; we want to know what the estimated city revenue for the fiscal year will be, we want to know what the fixed expenditures are, we want to know the amount of the unappropriated reserve. Once we know the city's financial condition, we are willing to negotiate on wages. We are inclined to take whatever the council hands out with the statement that this is the best we can do.

"Take Care to Citizens" "We are suspicious of the city council's intentions and we believe we have a right to be; we have reliable information that many of the tentative budgets now under discussion provide for a layoff of four low paid workers; that there is over \$20,000 available in the unappropriated reserve; that there is a plan to raise the pay of all city workers \$10 per month—except the bus drivers—with substantially larger raises for some high paid employees (our contention is the lower paid workers should get the largest increase).

In view of the foregoing, the membership decided that they must take the matter to the employers of the Torrance city council—the citizens of Torrance. This is being done in an effective manner. We again ask that the city council set a date in the immediate future for negotiation with us on the question of wages using a tentative city budget as the basis. Jeffrey's letter concluded.
