No Labor Shortage Of Harvesters Here, School Leaders Say

truck came, and none has come there since. The pupils have not yet been paid.

"Perhaps the trucks were needed to carry fruit to the canneries. I hope so. Perhaps enough pickers were secured closer to the farms. If so, the schools should have been notified. One of the managers of the project on Sept. 20 said that the school children were a lifesaver. Not all are good pickers, but some are, and all pick some.

"If there is any way in which we can cooperate further, if we are informed, we will be glad to do so."

Schools Are Mobilized
That there is an "oversupply" rather than a deficiency of willing workers was also indicated this week in reports from other high schools—Narbonne, Redondo, Banning and San Pedro. That growers have not used the available pickers was reported from the governmental agencies here and in San Pedro which responded to the farmers' call for help.

From San Pedro came a direct denial that "by no means are the Palos Verdes crops spoiling to the extent of 90 per cent as has been claimed by some reports."

The school authorities, without exception, declared that their students have been mobilized into the "Food for Victory" drive and are ready and willing at any time to send an ample supply of willing and eager workers into the fields.

The next move appears up to the growers.

Mary Lee Taylor's Snowball Puddings
Broadcast Oct. 1

1 cup cake flour 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt 1 well-beaten egg
1/4 cup soft butter or other shortening 2 tablespoons water

Turn on oven and set at moderately slow (350° F.). Grease 6 custard cups or individual molds. Sift flour before measuring. Restify with baking powder and salt. Put soft butter and vanilla in bowl. Add sugar gradually, mixing until light and fluffy. Beat in egg vigorously. Add flour mixture alternately with diluted milk. Begin and end with flour mixture, beating until smooth after each addition. Put in greased custard cups filling 2/3 full. Set in pan containing about an inch of hot water. Cover cups with sheet of waxed paper or greased wrapping paper. Bake 35 minutes, or until puddings shrink from sides of cups. Remove from cups and serve warm with equal portions of drained, cooked dried or canned sliced peaches and Creamy Peach Sauce (See below). Serves 6.

All city employees who were included in the recent wage increase granted by the city council have received checks for their back pay, the increase being retroactive to July 1. City Clerk A. H. Bartlett announced Tuesday. The city has issued checks totalling \$2,603.99 for the two and one-half month period covered by the wage boost that extended to July 1. Municipal bus line employees received \$124.92 in back pay while the totals for other city worker groups were: water department, \$172.26; fire, police and other city employees, \$1,102.04, and street and park department workers, \$1,194.77.
