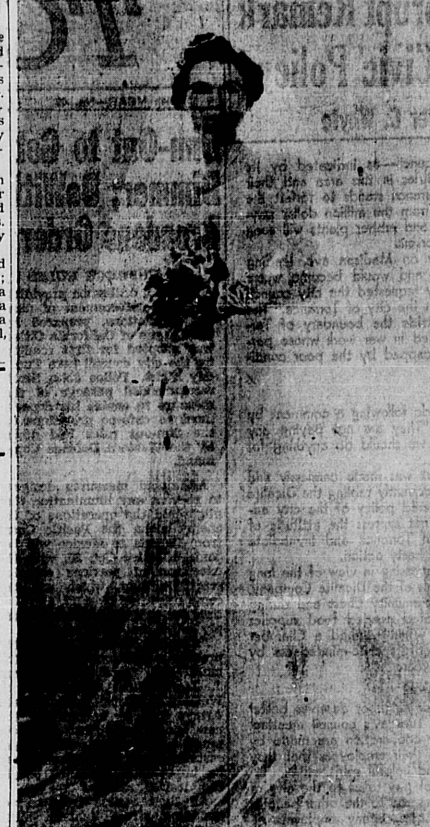
Matron Honored By Club Group At Shower Party
