

Street Light 'Blitz' Attack Costs Parents

Two 16-year-old boys here should have no trouble qualifying for marksmen if they join the armed forces when they take a few years. They "bagged" 21 ornamental street lights with a BB gun recently, according to police, and escaped being sent to Juvenile Hall only because juvenile court authorities urged police to "take care of the case at home."

Police claimed the boys, who shot out the lights while cruising up and down Beach, Acacia, Carson and Torrance blvd., damaged 21 but the sharpshooters claimed they "only got 19," according to Police Chief John Stroh. Their parents have agreed to make restitution to the city for the damage.

As the street lights were shot out, residents believed a "silent blackout" had descended upon the neighborhood. Some of the reflectors cannot be obtained now and the lights may become short circuited during rainstorms, Stroh reported.
