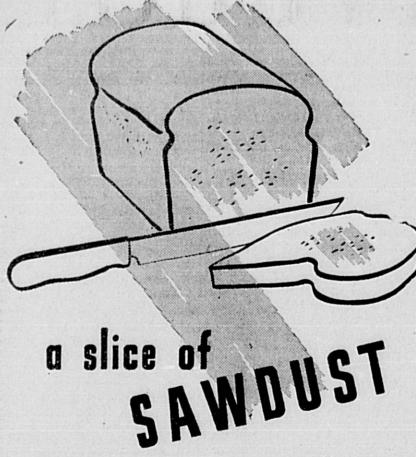

## Repeal of State Income Tax Aids War Effort

Repeal of the state personal income tax which requires a "Yes" vote on Proposition No. 4 on the Nov. 3 ballot is necessary to hold California's wartime industrial workmen, according to a statement last night by Workers for Votes of "YES" on No. 4.

"A significant example of reasons for repeal of this personal income tax," said the statement, "is the current drive by industries in other states to raid California industries for workers. Nevada, for example, is tempting workers with the lure that Nevada has 'No State Income Tax.'"

"This attempt to attract workers to Nevada to staff the growing wartime industries, we are informed, is meeting with real response because that state does not have such a tax. In California we have insisted from the start that voters should give attention to Proposition No. 4 on the basis of wartime needs at Washington. The repeal of the state personal income tax is necessary to aid the War Treasury at Washington because taxes paid on incomes to Sacramento under terms of the state tax are deducted from those paid Washington. In this way we are helping the war effort and building a useless surplus at Sacramento."
