Announced casualties of the U. S. armed forces now total 42,956, according to the Office of War Information Monday. This figure in cluded d killed, wounded, missing and prisoners of the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Coast Guard and Philippine scouts since the outbradk of the war, but not casualties in the African campaign.

Most of the Army casualties are classified as missing. A majority of these were in the Philippines and Java and are presumed to be prisoners of war, although information is lacking due to the absence of prisoner lists from Japan.

As of Nov. 12, Army casualties totaled 32,420. divided as follows: Killed, 1,069; wounded, 1531; prisoners, 161; missing, 2,9,668. Of the missing 17,500 were Amplippine sout 11,000 of the rs were Philippines and 11,000 of the rs were Philippine sout 15,000 were reported missing in Java. Of the 1,531 wounded, 552 have returned to duty.
