Postoffice Needs Cooperation as Never Before

The Postoffice Department now is starting the most gigantic task in its history—the movement of a deluge of Christmas parcels, pieces of mail daily to and from our armed forces all over the world. Indications are that the volume of Christmas mail will be the largest on record. In September, latest month for which figures are available, retail sales had reached a level second only to the record month of December, 1941, according to the Department of Commerce. And sales are rising. Such heavy purchases always presage heavy mailings.

If thousands of our soldiers, sailors, marines and civilian friends are not to be disappointed at Christmas time, the public must cooperate by mailing earlier than ever before and by addressing letters and parcels properly. The best efforts of the Postoffice Department alone cannot be enough, in view of wartime difficulties faced by the postal system. The public must assist.

War Taxes Service About 25,000 experienced post-att workers already have been taken by the war services. Arrangements are under way to add thousands of temporary personnel to postal staffs, but this manpower is hard to find and is inexperienced.

Facilities of railroads and air lines are heavily taxed by movements of huge quantities of war materials and personnel. Extra trucks are almost impossible to obtain. Winter weather, hampering transportation, is beginning. The free-mailing privilege granted to members of the armed forces has raised their mailings some 30 per cent, it is estimated. Expansion of those forces also is adding rapidly to the postal burden.

Three Registration Periods Fixed For 18-Year-Olds Next Month

Young men in this community who have reached or will reach their 18th birthdays in the last half of this year will be required to register for military service next month. President Roosevelt has fixed three separate registration periods by proclamation.

The week beginning Dec. 11 and ending Dec. 17 for those who became 18 in July and August, the week beginning Dec. 18 and ending Dec. 23 for those who reached that age in September or October and those who became 18 in November and December will register from Dec. 26 through Dec. 31.

The President also provided for continuous registration on their birthdays of youths who become 18 on or after next Jan. 1. If the birthday falls on Sunday or holiday, they must register the next day.

Hours Are Fixed This will be the sixth draft registration. The last, on June 30th, covered young men who already were 18 or 19 and those who had become 20 since the preceding registration.

President Roosevelt's proclamation said the new registration and the others which had been held were "advisable to insure victory, final and complete, over the enemies of the United States."

The new registration will take place simultaneously in the United States, Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico, with daily registration hours fixed for 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. (local time).

Reclassify Ex-Felons Late registrations will be permitted for those unable to present themselves during the stated periods because of circumstances beyond their control.

The chief executive asked that all employers give their workers sufficient time off to complete their registrations. Selective service headquarters has revealed that local boards had been instructed to reclassify all registrants heretofore deferred because of conviction of crimes.

No more deferments are to be made on this ground unless the registrants "are completely disqualified morally and are not eligible for a waiver under the new army standards," the boards were told.

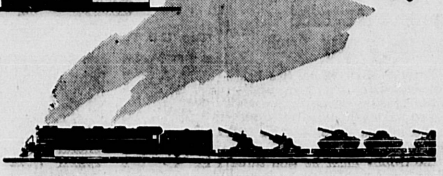
