#### HOLIDAY PUDDING

- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1 tsp. soda
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp. cloves
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup grated raw carrots
- 1 cup grated raw potato
- 1/2 cup finely chopped citron or citron substitute
- 1/2 cup finely chopped candied lemon peel
- 1 cup seedless raisins
- 1 cup finely chopped walnut meats

Sift flour, measure, and sift again with soda, salt, and spices. Cream shortening. Add sugar gradually, creaming well. Add unbeaten eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add carrots and potatoes. Dredge fruit and nut meats in 1/2 cup of flour mixture. Add flour to shortening mixture gradually, beating well after each addition. Combine with fruits and nut meats, stirring until blended. Fill well-greased 1 1/2-quart mold two-thirds full, cover tightly and place on rack in kettle. Fill kettle with boiling water to 1/2 depth of mold. Cover kettle and steam 3 hours, or until done. Add additional water as needed. Serve hot with hard sauce or a foamy sauce.


