### Here are the Rules for Compulsory Tire Inspection!

Inspector will check carefully on air pressure; abnormal wear due to wheel misalignment, faulty brakes, etc.; need for tire repairs, recapping, new tires.

Inspector will also check tire serial numbers; if he finds a tire on your car not listed on your Tire Inspection Record, he will report to the Ration Board.

If the inspector finds another tire or recap needed to replace a tire that can't be repaired, he will recommend this action to the Ration Board.

The first inspection for passenger cars and motorcycles must take place between December 1, 1942, and January 31, 1943. Other inspections as follows:

All holders of "A" and Basic "D" (Motorcycle) Books must have tires inspected every four months, with inspections at least 60 days apart.

All holders of "B", "C" and Supplemental "D" Ration Books must have inspections every two months, with inspections at least 30 days apart.

### 3,500,000 TO BE DRAFTED DURING COMING YEAR

The new year will bring calls to the colors for more than 3,500,000 men from 18 through 37, selective service sources estimated today, at the average rate of 250,000 to 300,000 a month.

The 18 and 19-year-olds completing their registration this month will comprise perhaps half of these inductees. If this ratio maintains, then the other 1,750,000, more or less, will be childless married men, for the pool of single men 20 to 38 available for military service has now been virtually exhausted.

**Planned Strength**  
The armed forces will have to attain their planned strength of 9,700,000 men below officer rank by the end of next year almost exclusively from 21,000,000 to 22,000,000 men in the 18-through-37 age bracket, and that bracket has been tapped for most of the 6,100,000 or more men now in the ranks. A strength in ranks of 7,600,000 for the Army, 1,500,000 for the Navy, 400,000 for the Marines and 300,000 for the Coast Guard is planned by Jan. 1, 1944.
