Advice on Food Poisoning Given

SAN FRANCISCO. — Food poisoning may be classified clinically as an intoxication, according to Dr. K. F. Meyer, Director of the Hooper Foundation for Medical Research at the University of California, and Dr. J. C. Geiger, Director of the San Francisco Department of Health.
