## January Wettest Month Here In Four Years

Four Years

January was the wettest month in the four years that accurate rainfall records have been kept by the Torrance Fire Department.

Its 8.74 linches of rainfall was more than double any previous January since 1940. The monthly rain figures, as compiled by the firemen, were: January 1942—40 of an inch; January 1941— three inches, and January 1940—3.78 inches.

Last weekend's storm added 1.03 inches to make the season's total now 11.71 inches as compared to 4.87 inches this time last year.

The torrential rains of Jan. 23 which showered down 3.58 inches in the 24-hour period did set a new record, however. The greatest amount of rainfall reported by the Torrance firemen in the past four years occurred Sept. 25, 1939 when 4.80 inches were calibrated.

The Office of Price Administration announced this limit Tuesday. The penalty for having more than five cans of vegetables or fruit (not contiling home-canned goods or cans containing less than eight ounce-cach) will be the loss of an 8-point stamp for each excess can when new rationing beck are issued in three or four weeks. An OPA spokesman said this penalty was designed to discourage hoarding. However, officials acknowledged that not everyone who has a large stock of canned goods is a hoarder.

For families the quota of allowable cans and the penalty will be applied as a unit. Thus, a family of five will be allowed 25 cans.

The new ration books will be passed out to the public in about three weeks at schools and thousands of other registration places. To get a book all a person will have to do is to show that not turn in his No. I ration book, which contains sugar and coffee stamps. Before the clerk hands out the new book, he will tear out one 8-point coupon for each can over the limit.

## Warren Budget, Deeply Cut. Has 3ig War Fund

Governor Warren really opened some eyes when his budget was handed the legisla-ture last Saturday. He recom-

budget was handed the legislature last Saturday. He recommended a total expenditure of \$463,947,005 for the 1943-45 bi-ennium, a cut of \$885,810,366 under the 1941-43 budget of Governor Olson, and approximately \$100,000,000 less than Olson's first budget in 1939-41.

Warren revealed that budget requests of state departments and agencies were trimmed in excess of \$55,000,000.

One of his funany recommendations was fast a sum of \$25,000,000 be set aside in a cut catastrophe fund for an eventuality of the war, and if not spent, should be transferred to help post-war financing programs.

Such large figures don't mean much to the ordinary taxpayer, but Warren pointed out that the total recommended expenditures in his budget represented a decrease of \$64,264,452 from the actual and estimated total for the present biennium and \$133,054,445 below the estimated total revenue of the state during the two-year period beginning July 1, 1943.
