Don't Rush Your Victory Garden; There's Still Time for Cold Days

Don't let that premature spring fever run away with your victory garden plans. In other words, the "frost might get you if you don't watch out." This is a warning that Los Angeles County Home Food Production Coordinator W. S. Rosecrans issued today. The recent warm weather, according to Rosecrans, has caused many gardeners to push their plans ahead of the season, not remembering that we still have time for some cold weather and frost in February and even early March. These clear, warm days are fine for preparing the seed bed and making other gardening arrangements, and there are a number of winter vegetables which can still be planted. Rosecrans warned, however, that except for the warmer areas that are relatively frost-free, tomatoes, sweet corn and other tender vegetables should wait for a while. Even if the home gardener is willing to run the risk, seed and nursery supplies need to be conserved in order to get the greatest possible food output.

L. A. to Annex Area Around Rubber Plant

The Los Angeles city council this week instructed the city attorney to inaugurate proceedings to annex a site bounded by Vermont ave., 190th, James and Figueroa sts., to the Los Angeles city area. The site, which comprises about 250 acres, was taken over some months ago by the government for the Goodyear synthetic rubber plant, which is now under construction. The annexation was recommended by the Water and Power department in order that Los Angeles could supply the plant with water and power.
