The recent warm weather, according to Rosecrans, has caused many gardeners to push their plans ahead of the season, not remembering that we still have time for some cold weather and frost in February and even ear-ly March. These clear, warm days are ly March. These clear, warm days are fine for preparing the seed bed and making other gardening ar-rangements, and there are a number of winter vegetables which can still be planted.

which can still be planted. Resectants warned, however, that except for the warmer areas that are relatively frost-free, tomatoes, sweet corn and other tender vegtables should wait for a while. Even if the home gardener is willing to run the risk, seed and nursery sup-plies need to be conserved in order to get the greatest pos-sible food output.


