Declaring the city was usurping the duties of the Civil Service personnel board, J. W. Crowther, member from Walteria, made such a good presentation of his case that the council rescinded one action taken Tuesday night and voted to keep "hands off" all personnel matters in the future.

The municipal board, on motion by Councilman George V. Powell, had ruled that all city employees who give up their annual vacation this year and stay on the job will be paid their regular vacation salary plus their usual pay.

Crowther contended that this was a matter for the personnel board and that each case of an employee needed to work during his vacation should be handled separately and not combined with all other city workers. Powell rescinded his motion, declaring the Civil Service Board member was "perfectly justified in his statement."

The council had previously granted C. M. Gilbert, bus operator, a week's vacation to put in his Victory garden. Crowther pointed out that this action was late, inasmuch as Gilbert has already had the time off and declared such requests should be made to the personnel board "before any such leaves are taket."

Information is being obtained from each war plant in this area in the form of maps showing the location of their workers' homes, existing transportation facilities and "corridors of possible extension" of present or extended facilities.
