"What is it?" "Is this a practice?" "Why aren't the radios off?" "Is this a real blackout?" and other similar queries.

"We have announced many times in the newspaper and at public meetings, that 'practice' alerts are not accompanied by audible signals," Chief Stroh declared. "Whenever you hear the air raid signals it will be the real thing. And please, please—don't call the police or fire station for information. We're much too busy during an alert to answer questions."
