

### Rifle Taken from Jap Displayed Here By Police Chief Stroh

 Harbor attack to serve his country.  
 "While my friend did not want to talk very much about his experiences in Guadalcanal he nevertheless told me something of the hell-hole that our Marines

cleaned out there. He also claimed to have seen two Jap women who were snipers killed in action. Both were camouflaged with green leaves glued to their bodies which made them practically indistinguishable from the dense jungle foliage.  
 "One was old and wrinkled and a Marine doctor estimated, according to my informant, she must have been nearly 80 years old. The other was between 30 and 35 and was pregnant.  
 "My friend was returned to

the States because he developed high blood pressure. He is recovering and ready to see action again. He also acquired a Jap Tommy-gun and brought it home as far as his debarkation point but the government took it there. The rifle's clip holds 50 shells and the rifleman pack a load of 2500 rounds of ammunition strung about their bodies.  
 "Guadalcanal Described  
 "I know that is hard to believe," Stroh said, "but my friend told

me it was true. The new Jap 30-caliber rifle is shorter than the 25-caliber.  
 "My friend told me that he believed it would take 10 years to drive the Japs back to Japan at the present rate of our advance but that rate is being constantly stepped up and the faster pace should bring an earlier victory. He was with the first Marine contingent to land on Guadalcanal and described it as the 'deadliest hell-hole this side of Hades.'"

### C.D. Members Must Sign Oath For Compensation

All members of the Torrance Civilian Defense Corps must complete one more formality before they can be eligible for any compensation in case of injury during practices or official alerts, Police Chief John Stroh, defense coordinator, pointed out today.  
 "According to a regulation of the Office of Civilian Defense, all trained and qualified members of the Corps must sign the oath and this must be on file with the personnel officer, who is Mrs. Lucille Lewellen," Stroh said.  
 "Mrs. Lewellen or myself have copies of the oath and Defense Corps members. Many have already taken the oath but to be on the safe side, I advise all air raid wardens, fire watchers, auxiliary police and firemen, casualty station and control center personnel, messengers and others to sign the statement at once."  
 Text of Oath  
 "They may see Mrs. Lewellen in the city courtroom anytime between 9 a.m. and 4:45 p.m. This is most important because in event of injury only those who have fulfilled all the regulations will be eligible for compensation," Chief Stroh asserted. The form of the oath for Civilian Defense Corps members is:

"I, (name), solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion; that I will and faithfully discharge my duties as a member of the United States Citizens Defense Corps; and that I do not advocate, and have not advocated, the overthrow of our constitutional form of government in the United States by force or violence, and will uphold the laws of the state of California, and the city of Torrance."


