### Wave and Spar Recruiters Due in S. P. May 28

Martin Wallace, Chief Yeoman, U.S.N.R., announced today that women desiring to serve their country in the WAVES and SPARS, auxiliaries of the Naval Reserve and Coast Guard, will have the opportunity of being interviewed, examined physically and sworn into the service all within one day in San Pedro. The service which will make this possible will eliminate expense and much time involved of candidates who formerly were required to travel to Los Angeles or San Diego.

Chief Wallace, recruiter in charge of the San Pedro Navy Recruiting Station, pointed out that this new service for local women was made possible by adoption of a plan for special recruiting crews, which will come to this area at intervals. This traveling party includes a commissioned officer from the WAVES or SPARS, two enlisted girls, and yeoman from the Navy.

"It is imperative that all applicants wishing to avail themselves of this quick and easy service, have all their application forms and papers completed before arrival of the recruiting crew here Friday, May 28. Patriotic minded women desiring information relative to this service may call on the above date for interviews and information. There is yet time for others to come to our station and complete papers before arrival of the party," she said.



**BOBBY NEISWENDER**  
**Idaho City Honors Crew of U.S.S. Boise**

Although he may not know it for a while, Bobby Neiswender, U.S.N.R., is a lifetime honorary citizen of Boise, Idaho, the citation having been sent his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Neiswender of 2054 Lomita Blvd. Bobby is somewhere with his ship, the U.S.S. Boise, which sank six Japanese ships in 27 minutes in the first battle of the Solomons.

The award is being given by the city of Boise to the crew of the ship and is a two-page engraved folder carrying all the names of officers and enlisted men, of whom 107 perished. Neiswender, who passed ammunition during the fight, was uninjured.

### Indian Method of Growing Corn Hailed by Cats

The old spirit of the pioneers, those dauntless folk who crossed the plains, took up land and planted their gardens in many a rocky field, runs in the veins of Miss Lute Fraser, member of The Torrance Herald staff, who recently attempted to qualify as an expert on corn growing and came a cropper.

She told the story herself and, because she lives in Lomita at 25934 Cypress st., and has a good garden, we want to share it with our readers.

Remembering that she had heard that to grow good corn, the Indians planted a dead fish in each hill to fertilize the kernels and grow fine corn, Miss Fraser, who buys fish regularly for her cats, took some and carefully placed a piece in each hill of corn and covered them up.

In a few days, expecting to see premature shoots bursting through the earth, she took a look. Imagine her embarrassment when she found that alongside each hill there was a carefully dug hole. Each piece of fish had been extracted and as far as she can determine, eaten by either her cats or the neighbors' felines. Miss Fraser figures that the chances are the Indian corn experts didn't have any cats to contend with.
