Home Canning Rules Clarified

In response to inquiries from housewives who customarily sell a part of the fruits and vegetables they put up at home, the Office of Price Administration has issued a definition of "home-canned" foods as distinguished from commercially canned products.

Under the processed foods rationing program, all home-canned fruits and vegetables have a "point price" of eight points per quart. Commercially processed foods, on the other hand, have specific point values assigned to each kind and container weight, according to the official table of point values.

Requirements Outlined
Processed foods are considered to be "home-canned" by O.P.A. if they meet the following requirements:

1. They have been canned in a kitchen primarily used for the preparation of meals, or in a kitchen used to demonstrate the preparation of such meals as in a school or home economics center, or

2. They have been canned in a separate building or shed which a farm home has equipped for canning purposes, provided that the owner has first obtained permission from his local ration board to treat food produced there as home-canned. This permission will be granted, if the applicant indicates clearly that the facilities are not of commercial-production scale.

Sugar for Canning
Food processed in any other kind of plant is considered by O.P.A. to be a commercial product and may be sold only at current point value, as listed in the official table of point values.

"Sugar for home canning can be obtained by using stamps 15 and 16 in War Ration Book 1 beginning May 24. Each stamp may be used to obtain five pounds of sugar. Housewives may apply at local boards for supplementary sugar rations for home canning, if needed."

Military Plan for Schools Gets Governor's Okay

Gov. Earl Warren has signed the \$4,487,000 state guard appropriation bill, and has approved bills authorizing the extension of military training to include students in smaller high schools.

The state guard bill, the governor said, will finance the operation of a community defense program for the state and looks forward to the eventual enrollment of from 12,000 to 15,000 men organized and trained in their home communities for service in time of emergency in their home communities.

High schools with more than 100 male students will be authorized to set up military training systems under the cadet corps bill. The corps will be supervised by the state adjutant general.

The governor also signed a bill appropriating \$100,000 for the training of high school cadets.

Scouts to Open Camping Season With Camp-O-Ral at San Pedro

Scores of Boy Scouts in the Torrance-Lomita division are making final preparations for the Harbor District Camp-O-Ral which will be held June 12 and 13 at Daniels Field in San Pedro.

The two-day Camp-O-Ral program will be one of the biggest outdoor events held in the Harbor District in the past five years. In addition to local Scouts, boys from Troops in San Pedro, Gardena and Wilmington will participate.

In line with the Scout slogan of 1943, "buckle-down" and "toughen up," the Scouts will march with all their provisions for the two-day outing packs on their backs from 9th and Pacific sts., in San Pedro to the field.

Colorful religious services are scheduled Sunday, June 13. At 6 a. m., Chaplain Father Kerns of the United States Army will conduct mass for Scouts of Catholic faith. At 6:30 a. m., Chaplain Carl Zimmerman of the United States Army will officiate at Protestant services.

The Camp-O-Ral is in reality the final preparation for the summer camp program. Most of the troops in the Harbor District will go to the George Peperdine Scout Reservation from July 11 to 18, inclusive.

Although its budget is far from adequate, the executive board of the Los Angeles Metropolitan Area Council has shaved off several important items, to permit Scouts to go camping at Peperdine without the usual dollar-per-Scout fee for use of facilities and to defray the expense of the trained camp and waterfront directors. This year, it will be free for the boys.

Disability Benefits Increased by Law
Maximum weekly temporary disability benefits under the workmen's compensation law will be increased from \$25 to \$30 per week under the terms of the Carter bill (SB1044) signed by Gov. Earl Warren.

The measure is for the duration of the war and increases the maximum average earnings considered in computing temporary disability benefits from \$38.46 to \$46.16 per week.

25 Million Ready in Case of Emergency
Twenty-five million dollars has been tucked away in the state treasury for use only in case California is invaded or bombed.

The fund was created by a bill signed by Gov. Earl Warren, designed to make it possible to get civilian relief measures under way immediately in cases of grave emergency.
