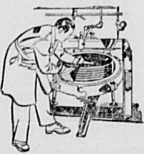

RATIONING TIME TABLE

RED STAMPS—(for meat, canned fish, canned milk, most edible oils and cheeses). Stamp M good through June 30. Stamps J, K, L also good through June. Stamp N becomes valid June 20 and will be good through June 30.

BLUE STAMPS—(for canned, frozen and certain dehydrated foods). Stamps K, L, M, remain valid through July 7.

COFFEE—Stamp 24 good for one pound through June 30.

SUGAR—Stamp 13 good for 5 pounds through Aug. 15. Stamps 15 and 16 good for 5 pounds each for home canning purposes.

SHOES—Stamp 18 good for one pair now.

GASOLINE—No. 6 coupons in "A" books good for 4 gallons through July 21. Save "A" book covers as they must be turned in with applications for new "A" book before July 21.

TIRE INSPECTION—"B" book cars, next tire inspection deadline, June 30 and every 4 months thereafter; "C" book cars, next tire inspection deadline Aug. 31. "A" book cars, next tire inspection deadline Sept. 30.

WAR RATION BOOK—Thousands of Book 3 have already been mailed back to Southern California applicants. Your name is already on the book but you MUST fill in your address, age, sex, weight, height, complexion, then sign your name in the space provided on the cover.

RATION BOARD OFFICE HOURS—At 2300 Carson st., daily from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

War Plant Jobs Tapering off

The rate of hiring of new employees by California war industries, notably aircraft plants and shipyards, has begun to level off, figures compiled by the state department of employment showed today.

The department said the number of placements in war industries during April by the employment service was 10 per cent below those for March, indicating "a slight tapering off in volume."

Major industries in which an increased volume of placements occurred in April were food processing, transportation, utilities and construction.

First Bonus Bill Enters Congress

Of interest to all service men and their families is the fact that the first bonus bill has made its appearance in Congress. Introduced by Congressman Joseph Clark Baldwin of New York, the bill would provide a bonus of from \$300 to \$400 for every member of our armed forces and the Merchant Marine, payable at the end of the war.

The bonus bill which is finally passed may differ considerably from the Baldwin bill; the amount of the bonus, for instance, will be the subject of much debate. But the veterans of this war will probably have their bonus payments waiting for them when they get back. In that respect, at least, they will get a better deal than their buddies got after World War I. For the time when the bonus money will be most urgently needed in most cases will be the first few weeks and months after the men come home, when they are putting their roots down and making a new start in civil life.



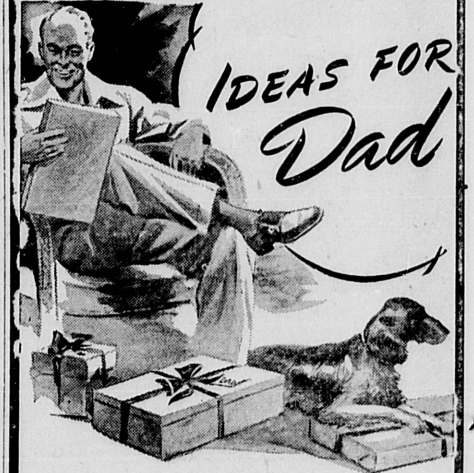

Communist Party Now off Ballot

One of the major actions of the 1943 legislature, sanctioned by Gov. Earl Warren with his signature of the Dillworth bill (AB582) was to bar the Communist party from the primary ballot.

The bill did not name the party specifically but it is the only group which comes under the new regulation that a party is deemed abandoned unless its registration is more than 1-10 to 1 per cent of the total state registration.

Auxil. Firemen Save House from Flames in Strip

If the auxiliary fire fighters of the Shoestring strip required examinations—which they don't—for prospective new members, Bruce Clements would not have to take them. He qualified for membership last Friday night by single-handedly battling a blaze that threatened to destroy the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jess Mays at 1607 Carson st.

He was playing a garden hose on the fire when the auxiliary firemen and their O.C.D. pumper arrived and scored their first victory over a house fire since they organized. Clements, who lives at 1615 216th st., has indicated that he intends to join the civilian defense unit as soon as he can.

The fire started near a couch in the living room and was discovered by Bill Raferty who roused Joe Page, zone warden, at 1601 Carson st. and he dispatched Lieut. Charles Dunham and his auxiliary firemen to the scene. The auxiliaries and their pumper have extinguished a number of grass fires in the Shoestring strip but this was the first home fire they have fought.

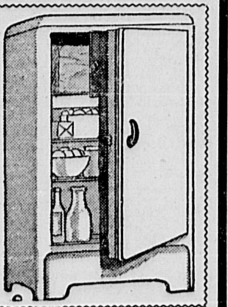
