**Evacuation Plans Formed for Any War Emergency**

One phase of the civilian defense problem which has provoked much interest is that of evacuation of the civilian population in case of an emergency. The first thought of the Army was to give out no publicity on evacuation plans, to avoid alarming the populace. Then the point of view turned to the point of just enough publicity to assure people that plans were made in case of trouble.

In addition, the Army and other agencies are holding training schools in the larger centers to make sure that everyone concerned with transportation knows his job at the proper time. Executives, foremen, and others are shown how to keep convoys moving, where to get trucks and fuel, which routes will be monopolized by the military, and kindred problems.

In case of trouble, these specialists could not only take over the job of moving civilians but give a hand with the military as well. More than 8000 are already trained and the number is growing.

**Thomas Named on Legislature's Jap Study Group**

Assemblyman Vincent Thomas of San Pedro, this district's representative at Sacramento, has been named to serve on the interim investigation committee to study Japanese problems, according to Charles Lyon, assembly speaker.

"Our committee has been given considerable authority and has the power to subpoena witnesses, indict for perjury, requisition evidence and hold hearings any place in the state," Assemblyman Thomas said yesterday. "We have two main issues before us—investigation of equipment and materials formerly owned by Japanese and now impounded and to study the question of permitting Japanese to return to the state.

"We are drafting our schedule of hearings and cordially invite anyone who believes he has opinions of value to confer with us on this highly controversial issue. We hope to obtain accurate information as to the quantity and kind of equipment, chiefly farm machinery, which is now out of use and which could be leased to white farmers to help in production of food.

"This should develop a showdown with the Federal officials who are holding this vital machinery and not permitting its use. Members of our committee include Alfred Robertson, Santa Barbara; Don Field, Glendale; Fred Price, Ontario; Chester Gannon, Sacramento and myself."
