Ways to dress up GREENS

Leafy, green vegetables, like spinach, chard, and beet tops, are plentiful in Vitamin A, and rich also in Vitamin C, iron and calcium. But for some tastes it takes a bit of dressing up to win them a welcome at the table.

Try adding "new" taste to greens with this sweet-sour sauce. Dice and saute 2 slices bacon until brown. Remove and stir 1 lbs. flour into fat. Add 3/4 c. boiling water, 3 tbs. vinegar, 1 tbs. sugar, 1/2 tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp. dry mustard. Stir until thickened. Cool slightly. Stir in 1 lightly beaten egg, and cook 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Add bacon and serve over cooked or raw shredded greens.

Watch them perk up when you serve a spinach salad mold. Press 4 c. seasoned spinach into molds and arrange on lettuce. Garnish with tomato and cucumber slices. Add 4 tbs. grated cheese and 2 minced, hard-cooked eggs or 1/2 c. French dressing and pour over salad. Chill.

To give lure to swiss chard, try this recipe. Melt 2 tbs. clarified fat, add 1 small chopped onion. Cook on gas range to a golden brown. Stir in swiss chard until it is covered with fat. Salt, and add boiling water to cover bottom of pan. Cover and cook 10 minutes.

Greens should be washed, not soaked, and cooked by short, quick steaming in 1/4 inch of boiling water.

We do not pretend to know who is right, and who is wrong in the angry disagreement which has flared up in Washington between Vice President Wallace and Secretary of Commerce Jesse Jones, nor do we believe the people have any great interest in their personal differences. State's Servicemen Aided by Vote Laws

Frank M. Jordan, California secretary of state, has asked permission of the War and Navy departments to inform California citizens in the armed forces of changes in the state election law making it easier for them to vote.

The election law changes, enacted by the 1943 legislature, permit members of the armed forces to register to vote, and permit any commissioned officer to certify the signature of an enlistee.

The first change will permit thousands of youths, who had not reached their 21st birthday at the time they were inducted, to register for voting.
