

JUST LIKE NEW—Manager C. Z. Ward of the Torrance Municipal Bus Lines admires the first of the city buses which have been completely overhauled, repaired and redecorated.

The "rolling stock" of the Torrance Municipal Bus line are being completely overhauled and redecorated and will be in first-class condition to give uninterrupted service for months to come.

Manager C. Z. Ward said today that the first bus that has undergone this badly-needed renovation is "as good as any new vehicle we might have purchased—if there had been any new buses on the market."

Every operating part on the

machines will be inspected and replaced with new parts if found to be worn or in need of repair. The mechanical work is being done by experts and Ward declares that the first machine to roll off the repair line has been found in excellent operating condition after exhaustive road tests.

The council Tuesday night approved payment of \$1,976.07 for the work on Bus No. 106, the first to be reconditioned under

Ward's direction.

Ward announced that the new bus fares have been approved by both the Los Angeles Board of Public Utilities and the Office of Defense Transportation and will go into effect Sunday, July 18. The new tariffs provide 10 instead of 12 commutation tickets for \$2.50 and elimination of round-trip tickets.

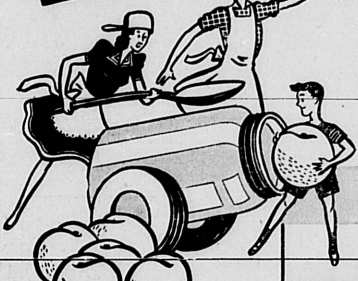

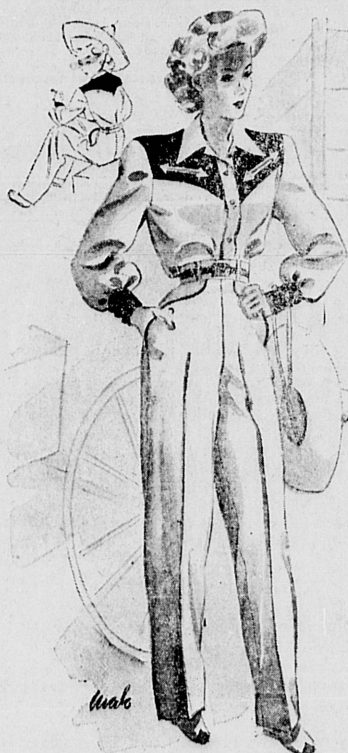
