Lieut. Boyer Aids Bombing Of Shipyards

Dispatches from Great Britain gave brief mention recently to the bombing of Kiel shipyards in Germany by Flying Fortresses and Spitfires, one being flown by a Lomita boy, Lieut. Charles C. Boyer, 23-year-old son of Mrs. A. E. Loe of 1919 262nd st.

Between answering phone calls and showing us pictures of Charles—she calls him "Jerry"—ships were flying around in formation about First Lieut. Boyer, whose ship was named "Tail End Charlie," because while the ships were flying around formation before leaving for Britain, the commanding officers and other high ranking officials all ways rode in the ship Boyer piloted and stayed at the tail end of the formation to observe the other ships. Boyer wasn't very enthused about the nickname.

Not Tallender Now

Before taking off for England in his Spitfire, he personally painted a picture of a very active donkey on the side of the ship. From the mule's flying hoofs bombs were being hurled and from its snorting nostrils more bombs were being tossed at the enemy. Boyer's design is still on the ship, his mother

says and showed us pictures of it.

"I'll bet they don't call him 'Tail End Charlie' now," she said with pardonable pride. "Jerry" is her only son. His father died when the boy was eight. He attended school in San Pedro, then went to Pasadena where he graduated from Pasadena high, and attended the University of California at Berkeley for three years, where he got the urge to fly airplanes. During his years at the university, young Boyer took pre-flight training at the Alameda airport, hitchhiking to the field every morning early for his strenuous work.

As a result he had a commercial pilot's license before he joined the Army Air Force in June, 1941. He won his wings at Lake Charles, La., in August, 1942 and was commissioned a first lieutenant shortly before he left for England in April of this year. The flyer wrote his mother that one of his greatest thrills when he took off for Europe with his squadron, was flying around the Statue of Liberty and Empire State building. He says he likes Great Britain and London but prefers Lomita. "And when I come back have plenty of potatoes and onions," he urges his mother.

Mother Flies Too

Mrs. Loe likes flying, having flown all over South America, over the Andes and from the west to the east coast. She says "Jerry" is apparently a natural born pilot, as he has had many responsible flying missions since gaining his commission. Naturally she was thrilled with the news of his flight over the German shipyards and feels proud of his achievements. She told us that he insists the Spitfire is a marvelous ship, and he loves to fly them. He, of course, she said, was partial to "Old Tail End Charlie."

High praise for the Spitfires which escorted the Fortresses was given Boyer and his fellow pilots by Col. Herbert Thatcher, group commander, who pilots a ship called the "Ranch Rascal" and his copilot, Lieut. Maurice Struhl.

By publicizing the speed control program, the police department has attempted to secure voluntary compliance to the speed restrictions and to minimize the necessary enforcement measures.

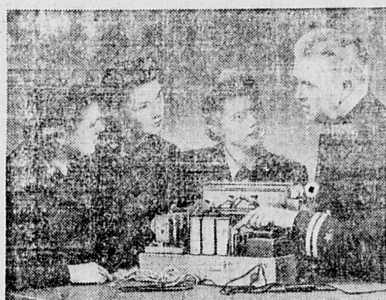

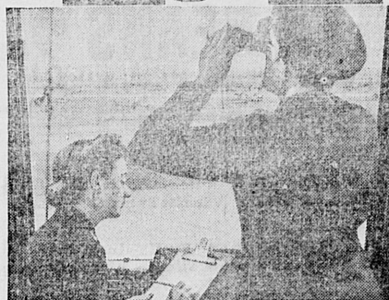

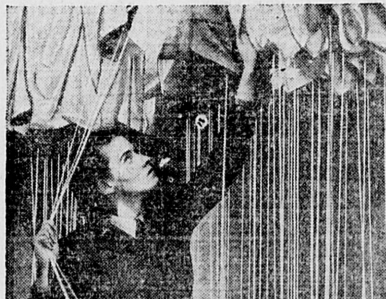
