Such programs are to the advantage of both management and labor. They increase employee earnings while reducing unit cost, promote more satisfactory employer-employee relationship, and reduce waste and inefficiency," the association said.

Such incentive plans have been approved in a number of instances by the Regional War Labor Board.

Installation of incentive programs need not be a tedious process, existing records usually being sufficient to arrive at average labor cost per unit of production and the average number of units produced in a given period of time.

Incentive plans may be worked out either on an individual basis, a department basis, or plant wide, and simply stated consist of a method by which employees may be paid a bonus equivalent to a fixed percentage of the average labor cost per unit for all production over the average.

The plan should be thoroughly explained to employees, the association said, and it should be emphasized that under an incentive plan there is no change in the present rate of pay, opportunity for merit or promotional increases but in addition the employee receives his proportionate share in connection with increased output.

On a department wide basis, for example, where average production is 1000 units per week, and average cost per unit \$3, each employee would participate in an additional amount for each unit produced in excess of 1000 per week.

Plans so far approved by the Tenth Regional War Labor Board have been, for the most part, individually applied and based on individual output.

The association recommended wage incentive plan for management, but advised that any new plan should be submitted to the Regional War Labor Board for approval before adoption.

Skiers, Outdoor Men Wanted for Induction in Mountain Troops The Mountain Troops are expanding and are in immediate need of men who can qualify for this specialized branch of the service, according to the War Service committee of the California State Chamber of Commerce.

The Army wants skiers and mountain climbers who are physically fit for rigorous mountain training. Outdoor men and those who have lived and worked in the mountains are particularly desired.

Effective immediately voluntary induction of men for the Mountain Troops is authorized on the presentation to the induction station, after clearing through the local draft board by voluntary induction, of an A13 letter emanating from the headquarters of the National Ski Association, National Ski Patrol System, 475 Lexington ave., New York City and signed by Steven H.
