ORDINANCE NO. 347
AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE TAX AND LEVYING TAXES FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JULY 1, 1943.

The City Council of the City of Torrance does hereby ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. That for the purpose of raising the sums of money necessary to be raised by taxation upon the taxable property of the City of Torrance as a revenue to carry on the various Departments of said City for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1943, the rates of taxes for the different portions of the City of Torrance are hereby fixed and taxes are hereby levied on all taxable property in the different portions of the City for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1943, in the number of cents upon each one hundred dollars of the assessed value of said property as assessed by the County Assessor and equalized by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles, State of California, and

SECTION 2. That in addition to the foregoing taxes there is hereby levied on all taxable land only in the Act of 1927 Municipal Improvement District No. 1 of the said City of Torrance, as said district is described in Ordinance of Intention of said City No. 208, which said ordinance is hereby referred to and made a part hereof, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1943, the sum of thirty-five (35) cents upon each one hundred dollars of the assessed value of said property as assessed by the County Assessor and equalized by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles, State of California, for a bond sinking fund, such assessed valuation of such property being the sum of \$1,609,845.00.

That no other levies of a special assessment tax is made by the City Council of the City of Torrance for any other acquisition and improvement district for the reason that said districts are partly within unincorporated territory of the County of Los Angeles, State of California, and for that reason the duty of making said levies is enjoined upon the Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County, California, which said Board is hereby respectfully requested to make such levy in the manner and as required by law.

SECTION 3. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, a weekly newspaper printed, published and circulated in the City of Torrance, and immediately upon its adoption the same shall be in full force and effect.

Local Women Far Short In Grease Drive

Patriotic Southern California housewives battled "Old Heat" and the "Axis Shad" all over the kitchen in July, came up winners with 473 pounds of household grease, a fraction under the record production of the cooler month, June.

Zack J. Farmer, War Production Board general salvage chief said a sharp falling off had been expected. He laid the unexpected good showing to the enthusiastic cooperation of Southern women who realize the importance of fats collecting in the war munitions program.

However, housewives in Torrance and Lomita, who fell short of their quotas, came "point with pride" to their part in the grease collection, and is evident that much additional effort will have to be made, bringing these towns in line with the records of other communities.

Torrance, with a population of 12,000, turned in 1290 pounds of waste fats, while at normal rate of 16 pound per person the quota for the month would be 2000 pounds.

Lomita, with a population of 13,000, turned in only 401 pounds of its 2167 pound quota. Hawthorn City turned in 37 pounds, and Moneta, 21 pounds.

Gardena housewives turned 771 pounds and Redondo Beach 1829 pounds, both only slightly below their quotas.
