Maberly's Daughter Files Probate Suit For Share of Estate

Distribution of the estate of the late Alfred Lambert Maberly among nine children residing in Canada and Seattle, Wash., is sought by means of a suit filed this week by Mrs. Emily A. Chambers in the probate department of the county clerk's office at Los Angeles.

Maberly died intestate last March. Recently Mrs. Chambers and her sister, Mrs. Dorothea Gordon, both of Seattle, came to Torrance in search of information regarding Maberly, whom they claimed as their father, missing from the family home in Calgary, Alberta, since 1914. His estate, in which the children seek to share, amounted to \$7359.72, consisting principally of real estate, which will be cut, according to Deputy Public Administrator T. J. Hobson, to approximately \$2000 after all encumbrances on the property are lifted.

According to Mrs. Chambers' deposition, Maberly married Martha G. Mathewson in 1885, and she stated she had been informed her parents were later divorced. Maberly then remarried and came to Torrance with his second wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Shirley Maberly, where they remained until both passed away, Mrs. Maberly in 1936, and Maberly in March of this year.
