Contract Let to Raze P. E. Plunge At Redondo Beach

The Pacific Electric Railway Co. and the Mox Wrecking Co. of Los Angeles have agreed on a contract under which the latter will undertake the wrecking of portions of the Redondo Beach plunge, long a landmark in the beach city. The structure is to be razed within the next month.

The fish disposal outlet at the south end of the building will remain in that part of the building will not have to be moved but cafer further north in the building are to go.

It is believed that the plunge itself will remain and moves are on foot to open it for use of the public with the possibility of a municipality operated recreation center.

High taxes which have been levied on the unused structure will be reduced by its razing and the Pacific Electric Co. has tentatively announced that it will be open for a proposition for the conduct of an open air swimming pool.

The plunge has in times past been very popular. It was known as the largest hot salt water plunge in the world and was used not only for swimming parties but by many athletic groups for their swimming events. The plunge is nearly 50 years old.

Women Volunteers Wanted In Wac Ranks

Uncle Sam is calling 75 women from the industrial residential areas of Torrance, Lomita, Inglewood, Gardena and Hawthorne to volunteer into the WACs by Dec. 7 to replace soldiers in noncombatant jobs of the Army so that these men soldiers may go to the front.

The areas mentioned must recruit these women—not from defense plants—but from non-essential activities, between the ages of 20 and 50 years, unless it lags behind its share of the national quota for 70,000 WACs, a figure for replacements of wounded and killed sailors.

The WACs needed in Southern California reach a total of 2500 for the current drive.
