

Deer Hunters Turn In Over 9000 Tags

As of Sept. 28, a total of 9902 deer tags were turned in to the State Division of Fish and Game, according to J. S. Hunter, chief of the Bureau of Game Conservation. Compared with tags from the same counties open last year, 714 more deer have been taken so far this season. Counties in the lead are

Modoc, reporting 1052 deer taken; Tulare follows with 843, and Lassen next with 791.

Terms of Colden Will Upheld by Court Ruling

Superior Court Judge William J. Palmer Monday rendered a decision in the suit involving the estate of the late Congressman Charles J. Colden which ended about four years of litigation. Judge Palmer ruled that Mrs. Colden would share in the large estate of the former lawmaker and pioneer resident of the harbor district under the terms of his will.

Colden died in 1938 leaving a testament which bequeathed \$207,000 worth of California property and 3200 acres of Texas land in equal shares to his widow, his son, Charles, Jr., and three of Colden's children by a former marriage.

Following her husband's death Mrs. Colden brought a court action to determine what portion of California land should be considered community property so that she could elect if she desired to take one-half in community property rather than one-fifth of the total estate.

However, when Mrs. Colden with the other heirs to the estate signed two oil leases involving Texas property, Judge Palmer ruled that by this action she, in effect, had decided the local litigation herself by classing herself with the heirs.

The jurist held that Mrs. Colden is now "stopped from claiming any portion of the estate as community property" and ordered distribution of the estate according to terms of the will.

Homesick Visitor Returns to Old Scenes in Brooklyn

Mrs. Lenora B. Klusman, 2018 Carson st., Torrance, believes she has solved "The Brooklyn Bridge Mystery" insofar as her father, William J. Hall, aged 89, is concerned, in a communication received by The Herald this week. Mr. Hall has been visiting at the home of his daughter for about four months. He had been in Los Angeles some weeks ago when he observed a street car bearing the sign, "To Brooklyn." This revived memories of the old days in Brooklyn, N.Y.—he became homesick to return to old scenes, repeatedly remarking about that Brooklyn car. Everything was made clear to Mr. and Mrs. Klusman when they saw the same car just a few days before Mr. Hall departed, he said, to visit a half brother whom he has not seen for 50 years.

Previously Mrs. Klusman had known about the Brooklyn car and her father's references to it continued mystifying. It was concluded to let him have his wish and arrangements were made to send him back east where he would be with other relatives and where he will have less trouble in finding the "Brooklyn car" that will take him to the Brooklyn bridge.

"To be homesick is a terrible illness. Dad couldn't stand it any longer. He just had to find a way to escape. Well, he did. God bless him, wherever he is," remarked Mrs. Klusman.

Horse, Mule Disease Hits North Counties

A disease of horses and mules known as equine encephalomyelitis was "very prevalent" in August, with cases reported from practically all parts of California, the State Department of Agriculture has reported.

Worst hit counties were Siskiyou, Lassen, Shasta, Tehama, Mendocino, Lake, Napa and Ventura, said the department, which recommended vaccination of all horses and mules in the spring as a control measure.

Child Labor Laws Relaxation Limited, Says Gov. Warren

Gov. Earl Warren states that the state has already relaxed child and women's labor laws as far as can be done without an adverse effect on public health and welfare.

"Even if we are at war," Warren said, "we don't want a generation of California children to be deprived of an education."

"We want to live up to both the letter and the spirit of the women's and children's working laws," Warren declared.

Under present state law no child 16 or 17 years old can work more than eight hours a day. This period includes at least four hours of schooling.

Fewer Accidents On Rural Highways

Traffic accidents apparently are happening less frequently on rural highways in the state, compared to pre-war figures, than they are on city streets, the state public works department announced today.

During the first six months of 1943, as compared to the similar 1942 period, there was a 41 per cent decrease in reported traffic accidents as compared with a 22 per cent decrease in traffic on the rural state highway system, C. H. Purcell, public works, director said.

Considering the state as a whole, there was a decrease of 17 per cent in reported accidents as compared with a 21 per cent decrease in traffic. On the same basis of comparison, Purcell added, total gasoline consumption shows a decrease of 18 per cent.
