

Sixty Boy Scouts to Get Awards At Court of Honor Friday Night

More than 60 Boy Scouts from Torrance, Lomita, Gardena and Keystone will receive awards tomorrow night in a gigantic Court of Honor in the Torrance high school auditorium. More than 800 local residents are expected to be on hand when the program starts at 7:30 p.m.

The Scouts will receive awards, ranging from second class to Eagle Palm ranks, in what looms as the most colorful Court of Honor ever held in the Harbor district.

Alton DuRant of Troop 215, sponsored by the Kiwanis club of Lomita, will be given special recognition when he receives his Eagle Scout award.

Eagle Scout Awards
George P. Thatcher, a neighborhood commissioner in the Torrance - Lomita division, will be presented with his Eagle Scout award.

The Eagle awards will be made by Dennis T. Stake, Harbor District commissioner, who was recently honored himself by receiving the Scoutmaster's Key award.

Rex Eipper, also a member of Troop 215, will receive his Eagle Gold Palm award, which is granted to Scouts, who have earned ten merit badges over the requirements for Eagle rank and who have had at least one year's service in Scouting since receiving the Eagle rank.

Robert Moffitt, a fireman in the Torrance Fire department, is Scoutmaster of Troop 215.

Will Present Skit
An impressive skit, based upon the Scout oath and law, will be presented by Troop 215. The Scouts have practiced on this

skit for two months and it is believed to be the finest ever put on in a Scout ceremony here.

Troop 241 will be presented with a special award for its fine window display during Boy Scout Anniversary week last year.

Troop 241 is sponsored by the St. Andrew's Episcopal church. The presentation will be made by Ben Bendat of the San Pedro B'nai B'rith lodge.

Other special awards will be made to individual place winners and Troops, which participated in the recent Boy Scout Field day at the Torrance city park.

Herschel Darnell, president of the Kiwanis club of Lomita, which contributed the awards, will make the presentations.

Soldier Christmas Parcel Deadline Changed to Dec. 10
An extension to Dec. 10 of the deadline for mailing Christmas parcels to soldiers who left home stations after Sept. 30 for overseas was announced by the foreign department of the postoffice.

Only persons with official notification of the soldier's change of address can post parcels, which must conform to the rules—no more than five pounds in weight, and 15 inches in length and 36 inches in combined length and girth. Senders must present the notification of the change of address when they appear at the postoffice. Only one package may be mailed.

Battlefield Salvage Center to Be Located in Southland Area
Through a systematic collection of battlefield salvage the Army Service Forces are saving the government millions of dollars, according to an authorized Army bulletin.

But because of the increasing tonnage arriving at Los Angeles Harbor the Army has found it necessary to acquire a salvaging segregation center so that the port may be kept clear of the scrap and salvage as rapidly as it arrives. Like centers have been established at other points on the coast. At these centers salvage is carefully sorted, that which can be reclaimed is culled out and sent to repair depots, while the residual material is sold to scrap dealers.

Under the salvage segregation policy as established by headquarters of the Army Service Forces in Washington, the responsibility now will rest with the Ninth Service Command, headquarters at Fort Douglas, Utah.

Lt. Col. B. P. Spry, chief of salvage activities, in the Ninth Service Command, and Capt. W. S. Whitehead of the production division, redistribution and salvage branch, A.S.F., headquarters, Washington, are now at Wilmington to supervise the task of setting up the proposed center. They have come to the port after activating salvage units at San Francisco and Seattle.

Capt. Whitehead, who considers this project to be particularly important in view of the serious dirt of scrap in the Los Angeles area, said the lease for land will be signed soon. The site will be some distance away from the port.

Besides the huge volume of scrap coming from Army installations overseas, the salvage segregation center serving this area will receive an equally large quantity of Navy scrap under arrangements made by the War Department and the Navy Department whereby the Army is designated as the assembling and shipping agent for Navy salvage.

This also will serve to eliminate the always-present danger of setting off explosives inadvertently collected in the scrap. Since the scrap will not be sorted until it reaches the center, the sealed fuel tanks, live or inert ammunition, bombs or other potentially explosive items can be carefully removed at a safe distance from the fort.

All types of salvage will be handled, including clothing, rubber, paper, glass and such smaller items as shoes, which are sent back by the railroad for repair, or, if beyond redemption, for salvage of the leather in them.
