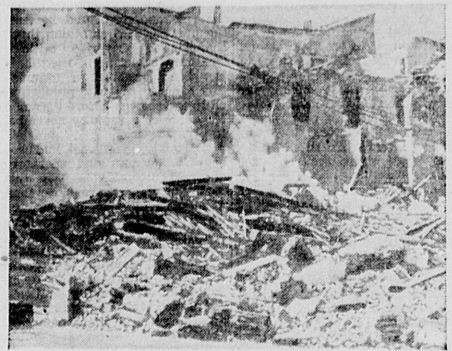

## County Death Rate Lower; Births Show Remarkable Gain

That the death rate for the Los Angeles county health department area is less than that of either the county as a whole or of the state was pointed out by R. G. Webster, chief of the department's vital records division in a recent report. The death rate (figured on deaths per thousand population) for county health department area in 1942 was 8.9, while the rate for the county during the same period was 10.6 and for the state 11.1.

Webster's report disclosed that the increase in number of births in health department area in 1942 as compared with 1941 is the greatest ever recorded in any annual period. There were 25,100 births to persons residing in county health department territory of which over 92 per cent were in hospitals. Hospital births in this area have increased steadily during the past five years.

## Home Owners Urged To Maintain Homes in Good Repair

Cash funds in amounts necessary for the maintenance and repair of existing residences continue available to home owners throughout Southern California under F.H.A.'s Title I, home repair plan, according to W. G. Bingham, district director, Federal Housing Administration.

## FBI Agents Now Trailing Draft Delinquents

Col. Kenneth H. Leitch, state selective service director, today announced his agency was cooperating with the F.B.I. and U.S. attorneys in rounding up "thousands of out-of-state delinquents who are residing in California" as well as some 7000 men listed as delinquent by California local boards.

"Great numbers of these registrants are delinquent by reason of failing to report change of address or change of status to their respective local boards," Leitch said.

He added that delinquents in these categories and those who have failed to obey board orders will be reclassified into 1-A unless they clear up their status immediately.

Number of registrants listed as delinquent varied by counties from 2282 to 2. The 7000 California delinquents included: Los Angeles, 2282; San Francisco, 852; Sacramento, 402; San Joaquin, 369; Fresno, 357; Alameda, 317; San Diego, 296; Imperial, 237; Monterey, 205; Alameda, 183; Kern, 122; Santa Barbara, 147; San Bernardino, 138; Orange, 132; Riverside, 119; Tulare, 109.
