Delinquent Tax Sale to Take Place Nov. 19

Participating in the campaign of Los Angeles county to restore \$30,000,000 worth of tax delinquent properties to the assessment rolls, The Torrance Herald in this issue prints a notice of the tax sale scheduled for Nov. 19 in which approximately 1600 properties are to be offered at public auction. This newspaper is one of the \$1 being used in advertising the sale. In accordance with a policy laid down by the Board of Supervisors all tax decreed properties offered must now be advertised in a newspaper of the community in which the affected properties are situated. Street locations of both improved and unimproved properties are given in the advertisements.

Sales are being conducted every two or three months in the county's efforts to reduce the total of 96,000 tax-decreed properties which make up almost 40 per cent of the state's total. The next sale, following that of Nov. 19, will be in February, according to Warren E. Schwab, deputy county tax collector in charge of tax-decreed properties. Applications for the February sales are to close shortly, Schwab states.

Under the county's present policy the minimum acceptable bid per hundred dollars assessed valuation on properties put up for sale at the request of applicants must be an amount equal to the current year's school, county and municipal or road district taxes, multiplied by seven. This figure is approximately seven years' taxes, and is a price generally much less than the assessed valuation, often just a third or less, depending upon the tax rate. Applicants to pay offerings must agree to the nominal cost of the advertising.

Mail Christmas Gifts In Nov., Urges Conner

Postmaster C. Earl Conner this week urged local residents to start now to do their mailing of Christmas gifts and cards. He told a Herald reporter that there is every indication that the volume of holiday mail this year will be the largest in the history of the postoffice department despite the shortage of manpower and transportation facilities being burdened to the limit with war materials and personnel. He pointed out that the postal service has sent more than 31,000 experienced employees into the Army and Navy.

"The only solution, the postmaster stressed is: 'Mail in November. Mark your parcels plainly 'Don't open until Christmas.' That is the only way to avoid disappointment on Christmas day, not only for many civilians but also for millions in the armed services," Conner stressed. Continuing, he said: "More than 200,000 extra temporary employees normally are hired to help with the normal holiday rush. This year, the extra employees will be women and high school boys and girls who are unable to work the long hours usually required and whose work will be relatively slow."

"To deliver the Christmas mails on time, therefore, it is absolutely necessary that mailings be spread out over a longer period so that available transportation equipment and postal personnel can be used during more weeks."

Adherence to the "Mail in November" plan, Postmaster Conner believes, will mean that the job of moving the holiday mail will result in a small amount of undelivered gifts when Christmas day arrives.
