Extended Child Care Centers In Prospect for Torrance and Lomita

Prospects seem brighter for establishment of extended day care centers at both the Torrance and Lomita schools, according to a statement today by Jenneve K. Miller, supervisor of extended day care in the Los Angeles school system.
 Miss Miller said that Harriet Michaelis, principal of the Lomita school, has reported that rooms for the proposed center have been found on the school grounds. She also stated she has asked the P.T.A. at Torrance to locate rooms wherever these can be found conveniently near the Torrance school.

A survey completed last fall at Torrance, Miss Miller asserted, indicated great need for an extended care center. Parents of the area are continuing to demand this service, she continued, but no space for the undertaking can be found at the Torrance school.

For each of the proposed centers, Miss Miller stated, three women with experience in handling large groups of children will be wanted to take salaried jobs as head teachers and teacher assistants. Applications should be mailed to her office, 735 S. Wilton place, Los Angeles.

At present, there are approximately 77 extended day care centers in the system, and more will be added as teachers are obtained to run them.

Each center, Miss Miller points out, enables working mothers to "stay on the job and finish the job" in war plants and essential civilian services as urged by the Citizens' Manpower Committee.

Flood Control Project Given Wide Support

Immediate construction of the flood control works on Lytle and Cajon Creeks, thereby affording protection to the transcontinental railway lines and the major traffic arteries of San Bernardino County is urged by the California State Chamber of Commerce. Congressman Sheppard of San Bernardino County has introduced H. R. 3118, which provides an appropriation of \$9,000,000 for construction of 27,000 feet of concrete channel. Raymond Darby Is Candidate For Supervisor

Raymond V. Darby, mayor of the city of Inglewood, announces his candidacy for the office of supervisor from the Fourth district. In point of service, Mr. Darby is one of the oldest elective city officials of Los Angeles County, having been first elected in 1927.

Darby is a native of the state of Kansas, a graduate of Kansas University, 47 years old, a veteran of World War I and a member of the American Legion. He is a builder of communities as well as buildings, as is attested to by Inglewood and the development of Morningside Park.

If elected to this office, he promises among other things to bring about:

1. A closer cooperation between county and city governments.
2. Active participation of county government in opening of beaches now closed because of pollution and improper sewage disposal.
3. Every possible assistance to private industry, business, and labor in the task of changing from war to peacetime activity.
4. Enlarging of juvenile corrective facilities and inauguration of policies that will tend to check the spread of crime and delinquency in the teen-age group.
5. Use of gasoline taxes and highway funds to provide superhighways so badly needed to the beach and harbor area.
6. To levy and expend taxes as he would want someone to levy and expend his own taxes.
