HELPS WAR WORKERS STAY ON THE JOB

THE CITIZENS' MANPOWER COMMITTEE is asking various business firms to remain open on some evenings-as a convenience and time-saver for war workers who want to stay on the job and finish the job. The Gas Company is cooperating by extending 24-hour service for certain of its facilities.

These around-the-clock facilities are available to ${\it anyone-}$ and make it unnecessary sary to appear in person at the Gas Company offices to handle certain routine business transactions.

The Gas Company's 24-Hour Service includes:

Arrangement for turning on or turning off gas service. By calling the Gas Company day or night number in the telephone book, anyone—including newcomers to this area—can telephone at any hour, day or night, to make arrangements to
have gas service turned on or turned off on some following day. If it is inconvenient for
the customer to be at home at the stated time, arrangements can be made over the telephone for the gas service man to pick up the house-key at a neighbor's. Signing up for
the gas service can be done at the time service is turned on, or handled by mail if the
customer is not present.

2. Payment of Gas Company bills at convenient night locations. "Customer Payment" slots at most Gas Company offices may be used after hours for paying gas bills. Or, if more convenient, payments may be paid by check or cash at the many conveniently located collection offices, not operated by the Gas Company.
