1,783 Voted A total of 1,783 votes was recorded in the election from a registration of 3,672. Tolson, high man, received 772; Powell 754; Gilbert 645. The remainder were divided among the seven defeated candidates.

Councilman Powell was late for his own inauguration. He was absent when the council was called to order—for the last time—by Mayor McGuire. The clerk telephoned Powell at home.

He was listening to his radio. He had forgotten the council meeting.

Adjournment was taken for 10 minutes to allow Powell time to reach the city hall.

Hitchcock Declines After the ballots had been canvassed and while Councilman Hitchcock was occupying the mayor's chair as chairman pro-tem, Councilman Casel moved that Hitchcock be appointed mayor.

Hitchcock objected, declining the nomination "for reasons which I cannot state at this time" and the motion did not go to a vote.

Hitchcock immediately placed the name of Tolson in nomination and the vote was unanimous on the roll call Tolson voted for himself.

Selection of the "new-old" mayor apparently met with heavy approval of the audience, which included a number of industrial plant officials and other Chamber of Commerce members there for another meeting, judging by the applause.

Tolson, taking up the gavel, said he was "a little nervous," but he expressed his gratification at being tendered the honor of serving as mayor and pledged his best efforts in the interest of the city.

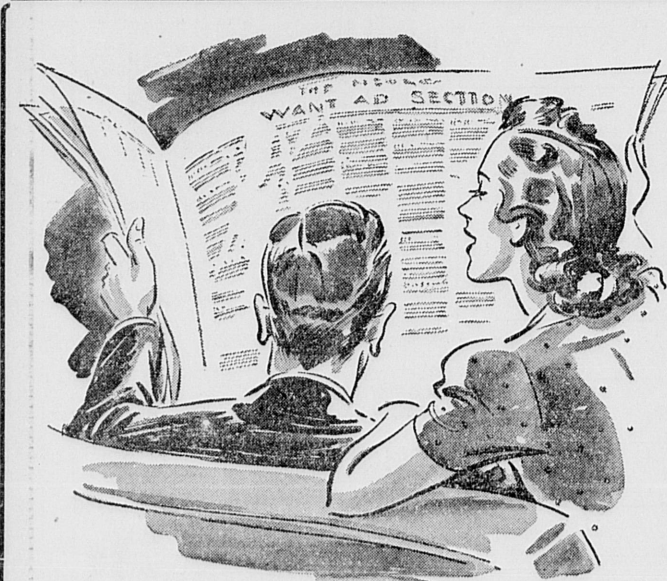
