Hauge's Defense of Small Home Owners and Lower Taxes Lauded

Re-election of Oscar Hauge by a substantial majority to the County Board of Supervisors as the representative from this, the Fourth District, is predicted by his supporters as the May 16 primaries draw near.

Supervisor Hauge's fight for the small home owner and against the dictates of downtown Los Angeles special interests has won for him widespread support of thousands of taxpayers. This fight reached its climax in the defeat of the attempt of the Hearst interests to foist on the county shoreline property unit for recreation purposes and at a price far beyond its value. This gained for Supervisor Hauge the enmity of these interests now opposing his re-election, but won him the support of the small taxpayer who would have been forced to foot the bill had this land been unloaded on the county government.

Supervisor Hauge is seeking re-election on a platform calling for economy, better service to taxpayers through decentralization of county government functions, procurement of desirable beach frontage for use of all citizens and a further reduction in the tax rate. He has been largely responsible for five successive reductions in the county tax rate in the last five years.

Decided benefits to Fourth district citizens are seen in Supervisor Hauge's decentralization plan as it will bring functions of county government nearer to them, thus eliminating long and costly trips to the present seat of government. This program has been given wide acclaim.

Supervisor Hauge has been responsible during his term in office in bringing about a fair allocation of gas tax funds to cities on a population and street mileage basis, the savings of thousands of dollars in tax funds formerly spent for fire insurance premiums, rehabilitation of tax delinquent property in the Fourth district totaling millions of dollars in value, a program of fair treatment to the aged and a sound business administration generally in county government.
