Daniels Warns Of Complacency In Home Canning

Abundance of certain foods on the market and release of many canned fruits and vegetables from ration control should not make housewives complacent about home preservation this year, according to Frank Daniels, chief clerk, War Price and Ration Board, Torrance.

Daniels said the lowering of many point values was possible in part because of home preservation of fruits and vegetables last year.

"The President has said that needs of the government services will be much greater this year," Daniels said, "and it becomes more essential than ever to can fruits and surplus vegetables from the victory garden."

"In addition to making commercial pack available for the armed services, home canning relieves transportation and distribution facilities now taxed to the limit and provides an adequate and varied diet for the family."

Endorsement of all gas coupons as soon as received is a "must" on the OPA program. Each coupon must bear the license number and state of registration of the car to which the rations are issued.
