

### NEW RATION STAMPS GOOD THIS WEEK

Two sets of new ration stamps, the first to come into validity since the removal of most meats from point charges, will come into use today. There will be five new blue stamps for the purchase of canned, frozen and dehydrated foods which come into use. These are stamps R8, S8, T8, U8 and V8 in ration book four. Like the other blue stamps now in use, they have no expiration date.

On next Sunday, June 4, three more red stamps, also from book four, become valid for use in buying meats, cheeses and canned milk. These are stamps U8, V8 and W8.

### COAT HANGER STYLES

Two styles of coat hangers have been authorized and are now coming on the market. One is new, made of cardboard and can be bought in the stores. The other is the familiar steel wire type of garment hanger. This latter will, however, be sold only to industrial and commercial users and the housewife will likely get them only on garments being returned from the cleaners.

### RATIONING REMINDERS

Meats, fats, etc.—Book 4 red stamps A8 through T8 now valid indefinitely. Stamps U8, V8 and W8 good June 4 for indefinite period. Butchers will give 2 red tokens for every pound of salvaged kitchen fats received.

Processed foods—Book 4 blue stamps A8 through Q8 now valid indefinitely. Stamps R8 through V8 good June 1 and thereafter indefinitely.

Sugar—Book 4 stamps 30 and 31 valid for five pounds indefinitely; stamp 40 good for five pounds for home canning through Feb. 28, 1945.

Obtain application for additional earning sugar at local OPA boards. Application, when filled out, must be accompanied by spare stamp 37. First period applications may be filed now and until July 15. Second period applications may be filed from July 15 to Oct. 20.

Shoes—Book 3 airplane stamps 1 and 2 good indefinitely.

Gasoline—11-A coupons good for three gallons through June 21. B-2, B-3, C-2 and C-3 coupons good for five gallons.

Save your tire inspection records. They must be presented when applying for a renewal of gas rations. Any request to replace any passenger car tire must be accompanied by all inspection records and a new notation from an authorized inspector that a new tire is needed.

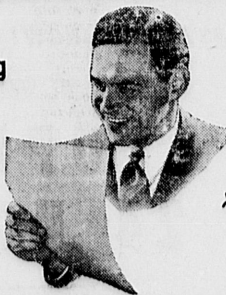
Truck tire (T-Book drivers)—Every six months or every 5,000 miles.

### Dr. Frank Evans Due In Lomita For Conference

Dr. Frank O. Evans, head supervisor of the educational housing section of Los Angeles City Schools, met with principals of Harbor area high schools during a luncheon this afternoon at Narbonne High to hear continued reports of Dr. Hill, chief surveyor for city schools in the proposed establishment of a junior college in the harbor district.

Principal Harold E. Perry of Torrance High School took part in the discussion concerning the needs of a secondary school in the Torrance and surrounding regions because of the steady influx of new population.

Dr. Hill reported progress made on present plans since the preceding meeting which took place at the first of May.

try to be located at some distance from the shore line. Prohibit the drilling for oil in any area within a minimum of 2500 feet of the shore line, this to be accomplished by a vote of the people."

**Erosion Protection**

Regarding erosion protection it recommends "the proper groining of the beaches to hold the sand in place. The widening of the beaches from Playa del Rey to the Redondo breakwater to an average width of 250 feet with sand to be removed from the dunes of El Segundo-Hyperion. The widening of the beaches from Redondo breakwater to Palos Verdes to an average width of 200 feet, with sand to be removed from behind the breakwater and from the bluffs of Torrance Beach. The removal of the Redondo breakwater."

Dealing with the problem of water pollution, the report advocates "an exhaustive study of the sewage pollution problem to determine the type of sewage disposal system needed and the desirable location of its facilities with a view toward the entire elimination of sewage disposal within the Santa Monica Bay. Should it be found advisable to discharge the effluent from treated sewage into the ocean at Hyperion, the sewage treatment plant should be located out of sight behind the hills near Century Blvd. rather than on the shore as contemplated in the disposal plans now being prepared by the City Engineer of Los Angeles."

**Would Curb Oil**

Also recommended is that "existing laws governing the discharge of oil, garbage and refuse in the coastal waters should be strictly enforced and additional powers granted to require installation of equipment and to prescribe operating regulations to eliminate pollution. A study should be made of tar pollution to determine methods of control and disposal."

The plan in advising "a co-ordination of the beach highway system with the existing major streets and the system of parkways for the region" advocates "a shore-line parkway as a section of the coast highway, to serve the beach cities from Palos Verdes to Venice," and the providing of "a shore-line pleasure drive."

**Remedy Congestion**

It recommends major feeder roads to link "the regional parkway system and the shore-line parkway" and minor feeder roadways to connect the shore-line parkway and pleasure drive. Adequate parking areas along the shore also are urged.

It meets the problem of beach congestion by recommending "the termination of major feeder roads at the shore-line parkway in order to disperse pleasure seekers conveniently in either direction along the shore line in preference to the present method of terminating the beach highway directly at the water front and thus encouraging congestion at these points."

Development of regional recreational parks, continuity of development and facilities and widening of sand beaches also are methods suggested to increase recreation space. Suggested is "the removal of the sand dune in front of El Segundo-Hyperion."

**Remove Buildings**

The plan ambitiously tackles a structural phase of redevelopment by recommending "the eventual removal of virtually all structures between the shore-line pleasure drive and the sea, and subsequent redevelopment in conformity to the development plan." It advocates "the preparation of a plan to introduce space through the removal of individual buildings, groups of buildings and full blocks based on a survey of the congested sections of the beach communities."

Also suggested is "the preparation and adoption of zoning restrictions controlling the bulk, height and use of buildings and particularly land coverage, in order to regulate future overcrowding." It advocates "a study of the possibility of assembling and unimproved land" and preparation of "a program of local street improvements within each beach community to conform to the suggested highway pattern."

**Space for Parking**

Regarding parking, the report recommends "the provision of a minimum of 16 acres of parking space for each mile of shore line" based, among other standards, on the requirement of "150 square feet of sand area per person."

### Rules Given On Point-Free Meat, Ground Beef

Rules on how southern California housewives may determine whether or not ration points are required for stew meat and ground beef have been announced by Frank Daniels, chief clerk, War Price and Ration Board, Torrance.

1. Under price regulations, all ground beef which is ground before it is ordered by the customer is classed as hamburger and must be sold point free.

2. If beef is ground at the request of the customer and in his presence, it requires the surrender of the same number of ration points as are required for the cut of beef from which the meat is ground. This means that surrender of ration points will be required only when the customer buys either steak or roast cuts and then asks that they be ground.

3. Price regulations forbid the display of cut up "stew meat."

4. If the customer requests that "stew meat" be cut up at his special order, ration points may only be collected if the cut of meat would require the surrender of points. Thus, specially prepared "stew meat" requires surrender of points only if it is made from steak or roast cuts. Flank steak does not require points.
