Who is God, save the Lord? and who is a rock, save our God? God is my strength and power; and he maketh my way perfect." This quotation from II Samuel will be the Golden Text in the Sunday Lesson-Sermon on "God" in all branches of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston.

A Bible passage from Acts reports that the high priest and the Sadducees, indignant because of the signs and wonders wrought by the apostles, put them in prison. "But," the account states, "the angel of the Lord . . . brought them forth, and said, Go, stand and speak in the temple to the people all the words of this life." When the high priest later summoned the prisoners for trial, the officers reported that they found the prison "shut with all safety, and the keepers standing without before the doors," but the prisoners were gone. "Then came one and told them, . . . the men whom ye put in prison are standing in the temple, and teaching the people."

In "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" Mary Baker Eddy defines "Angels" as: "God's thoughts passing to man; spiritual intuitions, pure and perfect; the inspiration of goodness, purity, and immortality, counteracting all evil, sensuality, and mortality."

Garden Grams

Spray Pumps
Stirrup pumps designed for firefighting as part of OCD program are being turned over to commercial companies by RFC for sale at retail prices approximating their original cost to the government—they're on the way for use as sprayers in the victory garden program.

Replant Tomatoes
Tomato plants showing diseases now while small and before fruit has begun to set had better be pulled out and thrown away. Replant with good healthy stock and begin pest control immediately, using nicotine sulphate or Black Leaf 40 one week and a mixture of sulphur with either cryolite or calcium arsenate the next week.

Ceiling on Fruits
Fresh apricots, plums, sweet cherries and Italian prunes are under price control at all levels except the retail and that soon. It is estimated 1944 prices will be 15 to 35 per cent below those in 1943.

Produce Values
It's lots of fun to keep track of the value of your garden produce. Have you checked the price of lettuce, carrots, cabbage, onions or beans on your retail market recently and compared them to the delectable, delicious, delightful product of your own labor?

Pests
Can't say enough against them! They are everywhere. Check particularly for red spider on beans (brown leaves on lower parts—get out the sulphur dust) and thrips on the whole garden (leaves losing good green color and developing "silvery" appearance—apply Black Leaf 40).

Irrigation Problem
Remember small stuff—lettuce, radishes, celery, spinach—need water but one foot deep and relatively often. Cabbage, carrots, beets, chard, beans—all kinds—sweet corn, need water but two feet deep, frequency ten days to two weeks. Tomatoes need water three to four feet deep, frequency three to five weeks.
