It is the job of Sergeant Mason to keep in perfect mechanical condition the vehicles that take combat crewmen to the B-17 Flying Fortresses which take off in attacks on Nazi targets in support of Allied invasion troops.

When a large-scale bombing assault on an important German industrial plant or on Nazi Idefenses in northern France is brdered, the work of Sgt. Mason persential to getting the Fortresses in the air and over enterestic services in the air and over enterestic services. If there were not hough serviceable trucks on loand to transport flying men to he planes, to carry fuel and equipment to be loaded on the bombers, or to haul explosives from the bomb dump to the Forts, the planes could nevertake off from the ground.

The sergeant is the brother of William Mason of 1028 Acacia st, Torrance. Prior to entering the AAF in April, 1943, Sgt. Mason was employed by the National Supply Company in Torrance.
