### SOLDIER VOTE ARRANGEMENT BEING MADE

Women's Army Corps applications for soldier ballots will be available at all Army installations within the geographical limits of the Ninth Service Command for the November federal elections and will be distributed not later than Sept. 15, it was announced by Lt. Col. J. O. Wiley, Service Command soldier voting officer at headquarters, Fort Douglas, Utah.

As chief of the newly formed Soldier Voting Branch, Col. Wiley explained that voting officers will be appointed at all posts, camps and stations within the Ninth Service Command, to provide soldiers with material for registering as well as the applications for an absentee ballot. Most ballots will go directly to the Secretary of State at the soldier's home state.

The Ninth Service Command, headed by Maj. Gen. David McCoach, Jr., consists of Montana, Washington, Oregon, California, Utah, Idaho and Nevada.

The branch throughout the command is expected to be organized by the first of August and will handle the voting of Waes and soldiers in the Army Ground Forces, Army Air Forces and at Ports of Embarkation as well as members of the Army Service Forces. Overseas ballots handled through another jurisdiction will be distributed Aug. 15, it was stated.
