Other well known cowboy contestants, all riding for the Cowboy Association of America, are the world champs in their lines, Wayne Powers, Red Jones, Jimmy Dixon, Wayne Cox, Tommy Williams, Ace Perry and Joe Arnold.

Some of the horse-flesh performing will be "Hell's-a-Shoot-in," Panther Milk and Sky Rocket. Complete Show It's all going to be there, folks, and no fooling. Getting back to the local boys, H. C. ### STATE GUARD TROOPS TO LEAD PARADE

Forming a composite company, under command of Captain Robert L. Lewellen, commanding Co. H, 2nd Battalion, 39th Regiment, California State Guard, picked troops of the 2nd Battalion will lead the Second Annual Torrance Rodeo Parade through the streets of Torrance on Sunday at noon.
