Veterans Services Center Formed By War Chest

Steps toward establishment of a Veterans Services Center were taken last Friday when nearly 200 incorporators of the organization met at the Billmore Hotel, adopted by laws, elected majority of needed officers, and received reports of progress made by the interim committee since the community-wide meeting of July 12th last.

Paul K. Yost, chairman of the interim committee, presided on Friday, when suggested by-laws for the non-profit organization were unanimously adopted. Veterans Services Center will provide a central service of information, counseling and referral for war veterans in the Los Angeles area. Planned over a period of months, it was sponsored by City and County War Councils, Council of Social Agencies, Community Welfare Federation and the War Chest. Funds for organization were allotted from the contingency fund of the War Chest.

Directors include its 254 incorporators; representatives from responsible non-profit organizations, health and welfare agencies in the Los Angeles area; designated representatives from various local and federal government bodies, departments or agencies to act ex officio, representatives of veterans' organizations, labor, business, industrial, professional and civic groups; War Chest officials, public and private health and welfare agencies.

Vice presidents, treasurer, secretary and an executive committee were unanimously elected from a slate presented by the interim nominating committee, of which Frank N. Rush, general manager of Southern California Telephone Company, is chairman. The executive committee was instructed to meet at an early date and elect a president. Now serving are:

Vice presidents: Mrs. Sunner Spaulding, Council of Social Agencies; Howard Dudley, vice president, Pacific Mutual Life Insurance Company; Col. R. A. Bringham, Veterans Administration; L. F. Olson, commander, County Council American Legion, and Walter Wanger, Wanger Productions. Frank L. King, vice president, California Bank, is treasurer, and Mrs. Walter Van Dyke, Citizens Advisory Committee, is secretary.

Occupational Therapy Course Being Offered

With an increasing number of wounded returning from the battlefronts, the War Department is sponsoring an emergency course in the training of occupational therapists at the University of Southern California beginning Sept. 1. Trainees will receive \$120 per month during the four months of university training and \$135 per month while receiving clinical practice at general Army hospitals for the eight months internship that follows. Tuition and books are furnished, according to Prof. Margaret S. Rood, who is in charge of the S. C. program.

Requirements state that the applicant must be between the ages of 21 and 35 with a college degree and should have had training in applied arts or home economics.

City Expected to Reduce Its Gas Consumption

Plans whereby every city over 5,000 population, all counties, state and federal employes in Southern California can cooperate in "home rule" mileage rationing for cars used on official business was being discussed throughout Southern California today.

This is participation in a national plan for conserving automobiles, gasoline and tires. OPA has set a goal of a 40% reduction of official mileage under the 1941 amount, but leaves it to the local government bodies to decide where the cut is to be made.

The following four-point program is proposed:

1. Creation of a "pool" of government owned vehicles, from which all departments draw transportation.
2. Advance approval of travel by a central agency, to eliminate duplicated or useless driving.
3. "Shuttle service" between separated government buildings.
4. Most important of all—appointment of a single mileage administrator to screen mileage applications for the agency before passing them to OPA for issuance of rations.
